## **A NURSE'S LIFE: Living and working at the Royal Adelaide Hospital**

In 2016, after 175 years on this site, the Royal Adelaide hospital will move to new premises. Many South Australians have spent time at the RAH as patients, or have visited family and friends. For others - doctors, administrators, orderlies, allied health staff, cleaners, gardeners and more, it has been a place of work. But for a unique group - the hospital's nurses - the Royal Adelaide Hospital has also been their home.



For much of the hospital's history nurses were required to live in. During this period, nursing was an occupation dominated by women, and they were required to resign if they married.

Times have changed now, and this exhibition looks back on what it was like to be a nurse at the Royal Adelaide Hospital.
